#### Context

- The Education Library Service (ELS) began serving schools in Nottinghamshire and Nottingham City in 1929.
- The service catchment has since grown and now also serves Derbyshire and Derby City.
- The service has been a part of Inspire: Culture, Learning and Libraries since April 2016.
   Inspire is a community benefit society with charity status established by Nottinghamshire County Council to deliver a range of cultural services. Inspire's mission is "To inspire people to read, learn and enjoy culture."
- As a School Library Service ELS aims to offer schools a cost effective way of supporting Reading for Pleasure and the Curriculum. We aim to broaden the range of material available to schools and save schools' money and teachers' time.






### OU Research Inspiration and Rationale

ELS is based on the core principles of; offering extensive knowledge of children's literature, children's reading practices, and loaning resources to schools. We believe this reflects all aspects of the OU rationale based on their research (Cremin et al., 2014);

- 1. Considerable knowledge of children's literature & other texts
- 2. Knowledge of children's reading practices
- 3. A reading for pleasure pedagogy which includes;
  - Social reading environments
  - Reading aloud
  - Independent reading
  - Informal book talk, inside text-talk and recommendations
- 4. As Reading Teachers: teachers who read and readers who teach
- 5. Reading communities that are reciprocal and interactive

#### **Aims**

- We are pleased to support local OU/UKLA Teachers Reading Groups, and wholeheartedly welcome this research and initiative
- Our aim is to develop everyone's appetite for reading for pleasure
   pupils and teachers alike
- Our librarians have an in depth knowledge of children's literature
   & want to use this to help teachers & pupils to Read for Pleasure
- Teachers and pupils have preferences as readers, and ask for suggestions and help in finding titles
- We aim to offer and suggest a wide range of books for our customers, promote Reading Aloud and Reading for Pleasure
- Our aim is to provide books to engage and stimulate everyone, which encourages Reading for Pleasure with its benefits of enjoyment, empathy, mental well-being and more. This encourages reading communities inside and outside schools





### Outline 1 Project collections

ELS Librarians make up each collection individually to fulfil teacher's specific needs. These can be on anything related to Reading for Pleasure, the Curriculum, or a mixture of both.





#### 2 ELS Mobile

- The ELS mobile library is a great way to help promote Reading for Pleasure in schools, stocking a wide range of fiction and non-fiction leisure reading for 3-11 year olds. It also contains books suited to older readers in Special Schools.
- Visits can last from 1 hour to a full day.
- The mobile library is accessible to children and young people with mobility issues as it has a lift.






#### 3 Best fiction lists


# 4 On-line catalogue

#### 9 The Brilliant Book Award

- This is an annual award voted for by students at Key Stage 3 in schools across Nottinghamshire, Nottingham City and Derbyshire.
- The Brilliant Book Award aims to promote reading to key stage 3 pupils
- ELS organises author visits to schools by the shortlisted authors (these may be shared by several schools)
- It is run in partnership with a local independent bookshop
